Kuster is the founder and co-chair of the Bipartisan Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder Task Force, a group of 140 Members from both sides of the aisle working to address the addiction epidemic. Last Congress, the Task Force successfully passed 26 bills from its legislative agenda into law.
